"Sure," said the old woman. "Let's go to that empty table."


When they sat down, Isabella asked, "What makes you so happy?"


"I would be glad to see you again," said Isabella, "but first you need to meet my dad and mom."

"If I had the great honor of being the next king, I would seek wisdom from others on how to make our people happy and successful."


After listening to Steven, the king and queen went to another room. "Did you notice that Steven always spoke about others and not about himself?" the queen said.

Then the queen took Isabella aside and whispered, "We approve of Steven."


